

## MLA

MLA references should be double-spaced (no extra space between entries), alphabetized, and indented every line after the first line. Always check with your teacher, though, for any modifications or additional formatting you may need to have.

Also remember that there are multiple ways that could be used to cite the same resource based upon how much of the resource you used (for example, just one essay from an anthology, one volume of a set, etc.) or how you view the resource. If you do have any questions, consult the most recent edition of the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, your instructor or a librarian.
